ENGLAND, Nora C (Florida) MAM TRANSITIVITY Mam, a highland Mayan language, formally defines transitive and intransitive verbs on the basis of person inflection. The actual use of transitive or intransitive constructions suggests that transitivity is actually a complex problem. An examination of how the agent and patient are actually expressed in various types of sentences, of how directional patterning reveals covert categories of transitivity, and of how verbal semantic categories are basically concerned with transitivity, clarifies the analysis of Mam transitivity.

(Musée de l'Homme-Paris) CONTRIBUTION A L'ETUDE DES MYTHES ET DES RITES DANS LES SOCIETES ANDINES Le but de cette communication est d'attirer l'attention sur l'intérêt que les documents archéologiques préincas présentent dans le cadre des études sur les mythes et sur les rites dans les sociétés andines. L'analyse des représentations figurées sur les vases déposés dans les tombes de la côte nord du Pérou entre -200 et 700 permet de rapprocher les scènes de l'iconographie mochica des mythes et des rites incas et de certaines légendes et cérémonies andines actuelles. Si l'analyse et l'interprétation des images mochicas sont justifiées, malgré des changements importants qu'il faut expliquer, une origine très ancienne doit être reconnue aux institutions et aux comportements sacrés et profanes des sociétés andines. Il doit être possible de montrer une certaine continuité depuis le premier millénaire avant notre ère jusqu'à nos jours, en partie basée sur la pratique de l'agriculture d'irrigation.
